RECONCILIATION BEGINS WITH OUR YOUNG

Reconciliation is a journey for all Australians. At the heart of this journey are relationships between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.



We all have a role to play when it comes to Reconciliation, and in playing our part, we collectively build relationships and communities that value Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, histories, cultures, and futures.

Our early childhood services have this same commitment to Reconciliation, and we recognise that 'learning about and valuing the place of Aboriginal people will enhance all Victorian children's sense of place in our community' (DET 2016).

Aboriginal cultures and histories may be incorporated into children's programs through developing a connection with local Aboriginal Elders, Acknowledgement of Country that services are located on, building an understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flags, and the sharing of picture books, music, art and resources. Most importantly, it is a shared learning opportunity within communities.
